Gerald Hann Candidate Statement

Dear Colleague,

I would like to take this opportunity to tell you about myself so that you might be better able to consider appointing me via NSBEP's first elections for Board members.

I was born in Halifax and continue to live in the city with my wife and son Noah, a grade 12 student at the Halifax Grammar School. We are avid skiers and winter is our favourite season! I love being active and started my career as a physical educator over 33 years ago. In 1987, I was teaching grade 5 on the Eastern Shore of Nova Scotia. Integration was implemented after a legal challenge and students with disabilities were no longer placed in special classes. Instead these students were quickly integrated into regular classrooms. Of my 21 students, 16 had some type of learning, emotional, psychological, or developmental issue. I would have felt terribly overwhelmed, if not for the support of people like Dr. Nina Woulff, Kanuk Majumder, and Dr. John Swaine, who were a few of the psychologists I met and who made a tremendous impact on me and my students.

This experience led me to pursue a career in psychology. Over the next 11 years, I returned to school and completed a major in psychology, a Master of Arts in School Psychology, and a Doctorate in Education, specialising in family relations, with collaborative training in both EdD and PsyD programs. Subsequently, I gained skills in practicums and internships in school and clinical settings. Most recently, I completed 4 years of post-doctoral training in intensive short-term dynamic psychotherapy. I currently specialise in assessment and treatment of clients with complex somatic and often medically unexplained symptoms.

Over the past 25 years, I have worked in a multitude of clinical settings, including schools, alternate education programs, hospitals, youth treatment facilities, correctional facilities, and more recently in full time private practice since 2000. I have taught at the university level, including training masters and doctoral clinicians. I have never forgotten my roots in school psychology and the experiences forged in working in rural settings. I have learned to work with people of all walks of life and this has been invaluable.

I have significant regulatory experience. I served on the NSBEP board for 2 consecutive terms as Treasurer from 2003-07. I served as NSBEP Delegate to the Counsel of Provincial Association of Psychologists from 2005-07 and have been a Chair of NSBEP investigations and also a committee member for several complex investigations. I was a significant contributor to the development of the current NSBEP Investigation process. Lastly, I have supervised several candidates, and also supported psychologists needing remediation.

Thank you for reading my candidate statement.

I received my doctoral degree in clinical psychology from the University of Calgary in 1998. Since then I have worked in the HRM as a Clinical & Forensic Psychologist including full-time employment with the East Coast Forensic Hospital and maintaining a small private practice. In addition to working with patients, I have appointments with the Psychology and Psychiatry Departments at Dalhousie and taught at the Graduate Level for a number of years. I also continue to be active in supervising practicum students, pre-doctoral interns, and individuals on the Candidate Register. (Sometimes it feels like half the registered psychologists were, at some point, one of my students.)

In addition, I continue to be involved with law enforcement. I'm the mental health consultant to the RCMP on crisis negotiation (e.g., hostage taking) and have worked with the Halifax Regional Police for years on officer education, crisis negotiation, and consultation on criminal investigations. Through my work with law enforcement, I authored the nationally available on-line training program teaching communication skills with Emotionally Disturbed Persons (available through the Canadian Police Knowledge Network). I have also been a special consultant to the Nova Scotia Mental Health Court since it opened its door in 2009.

Finally, I have been an active participant with NSBEP throughout my 20 year career. I regularly sit on oral examinations and had the opportunity to be a part of an investigative committee a number of years ago. I've always enjoyed my time at the NSBEP office and feel many important functions are served in monitoring entry and standards of psychology.

On a personal and community level, my wife and I have a son attending Acadia University and another in Grade 11. I have been active in amateur sports and coached minor baseball and basketball for close to ten years. Towards the end of my coaching career I was the president of my community Minor Basketball Association for two years so have experience sitting on committees and dealing with community concerns. Sara King, PhD - Biosketch

I obtained my PhD in Clinical Psychology at Dalhousie University in 2007 under the supervision of Dr. Daniel Waschbusch. My doctoral research focused on broadly on social cognition and aggressive behaviour in children with ADHD. After completing my pre-doctoral internship in rehabilitation and developmental psychology at Bloorview Kids Rehab in Toronto (now Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital), I completed a postdoctoral fellowship funded by the Canadian Child Health Clinician Scientist Program at the IWK Health Centre before working as a full-time clinician in a secure care facility in Truro. I obtained a tenure-track position in the School Psychology program at Mount Saint Vincent University in 2011 and am now a tenured associate professor and co-coordinator of the School Psychology program. Along with my work at the Mount, I maintain an active clinical practice; since 2011, I have held part-time contracts at IWK Community Mental Health as well as at the ADHD Clinic in Truro. Currently, I work part-time at Erica Baker Psychological Services, where I provide assessment and diagnosis services for a wide range of learning, behaviour, and mental health disorders and difficulties in children and adolescents.

My interest in becoming a NSBEP Board member stems largely from my involvement in training school psychologists and my commitment to the profession of psychology. I have a wide range of experience in the public and private sectors that will allow me to provide perspective on a number of important issues currently affecting our profession, the most important being the transition to doctoral-level registration. Although I am trained and work as a clinical psychologist, my work in the School Psychology program over the past 7 years has provided me with the opportunity to learn about this speciality of psychology and the unique challenges currently facing many school psychologists in this province. Since 1982, I am a registered Psychologist (N.S. 107) with Nova Scotia Board of Examiners in Psychology. Also, I have served on many APNS committees.

During these 36 years with the Nova Scotia Board of Examiners in Psychology and APNS, I have noticed a <u>gradual distance</u> between the Board and APNS that needs to be looked into and rectified.

I would also like to see the Board giving a more caring (not punitive) support to APNS members. There should be more transparency in our procedures and processes.

The course offerings of NS Universities that produce Psychology graduates (Acadia, MSVU and Dalhousie) should be evaluated by the Board so as to maintain the high quality of Psychological preparation for the new NSBEP members. They should especially be sensitized to the cultural diversity taking place in the Nova Scotia population.
